Last year OneWorld cared for 11,456 patients below the age of 19 and this project proposes an innovative, patient centered, team approach to mental health services for youth. The goal of the Integrated Primary Behavioral Health Care Model is to expand access to behavioral health care for vulnerable low-income children so that they have the opportunity to increase their educational attainment.</p>
